Cllr Mike – Stated the drone fly over view of the proposed changes on the TDC website is well worth a look.	
Bruce Struther - Stated after attending the SFP working group meeting last week that the plan had been pre-determined. He noted the project team had	
guidelines to get feedback and he hopes they use it well. He suggested they include a legend on the proposed plan map. Paul noted there is a option to modify or remove after the trial. Speeds in the	
area have been monitored. Residents need to report what is and what is not working.	
Gary stated has having 40yr experience in road safety that this plan makes no sense from a safety perspective and all the road safety states state this type of plan is unsafe.	
Marion gave some history of Aranui Road going back 40 yrs when Aranui Rd had a huge volume of truck traffic to and from Fruitgrowers Chemical and Lime	
and Marble six days a week and for at least 3.5 months each year through the fruit season when orchardists trucked their fruit to the wharf for inspection and	
coolstore while waiting for other trucks to take it through to Stoke. There was a huge traffic volume on Aranui Road and no accidents occurred. Parents took	
responsibility to teach their children road safety and road rules, along with being respectful and courteous to other road and footpath users.	
Del stated in the first SFP working group meeting they were told that a shared cycle path is very unsafe and this is the very plan being promoted. If space footpath was added on the other side of the road it would take pressure from the	
other side and would separate directional flow. Del also felt the plan had been predetermined and was a foregone conclusion.	
Bruce suggested that it could work if pedestrians and cyclists were separated with pedestrians on one side and cyclists on the other to avoid the mixed use.	
Marion stated that Ian Reid the Mapua Fire Chief stated at the working Group meeting that they had 60 calls a year and many of these are now as first	
responders. Ian stated that with the proposed plan with the narrowed road and pedestrian crossing humps that in an event of a first response someone past	
Mapua School could die due to the additional time it would take them to respond.	
Christeen noted that the Street for People project in Richmond that is further down the track than Mapua has had some items discussed at great length and that the decision makers have not wet fully accorded the proposals	
that the decision makers have not yet fully accepted the proposals. Mike reiterated that Vincent Revell (project lead) agreed to and has put the	

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		survey back up until the end of May. Mike also stated that future working group meetings are for logistics only. Paul stated that projects are started with the best of intentions, but nearly every- one feels the option presented does not fit the association members' wishes. Marion reminded the membership that MDCA have been working really hard over several years to get the Mapua Masterplan reviewed so we have a coher- ent plan the meets the communities future needs and within this plan there have been some really good safe alternative walking/cycling options and the SFP plan does not fit into these desires. CIIr's Christeen, Mike, Dan & Kit Mailing will take the feedback from the meeting back to TDC and report back to MDCA. They will also provide MDCA with NZTA's project Streets for People brief. Bluff Hill – TDC have received updated advice from their Geotech Consultants regarding the risks and mitigation options for safe longer-term re-opening of the bluffs road. A plan is being developed and materials sourced to implement a solution that involves a 50kph speed limit, two-way traffic along the majority of the incline but with a single lane one-way priority in the narrowest part with highest slip risk, and a debris barrier along the full length of the road. Once this has been finalized, the current traffic lights will be removed, but the road will continue to be closed during heavy rain events for safety reasons. Bruno noted that some cars were getting impatient waiting at the lights and were running the red light causing the odd issue for opposing traffic. A question was asked whether emergency services are notified when the road is closed as has been the case over the last couple of days. Paul noted that Emergency Services are routinely informed of road closures. Margaret noted that there was a road closed notification at the Aporo Rd entry to Tasman.
